




When do you use a pronoun?







When do you use a pronoun?

Simply, they replace a noun.

Usually the meaning of the noun has already been made clear.

For example:

The toy was broken as it had been dropped on the floor.

There are other types although we will be concentrating on the above.

Reflexive: myself, ourselves, himself...

Possessive: mine, yours, hers, ours, yours, theirs

my, your, her, our, your, their

Demonstrative: this, that, these, those

Indefinite: some-, any-, every- (eg: someone, something, anyone)

Relative (sub. clauses): who, whom, whose, what, which, that







I hit him.

He hit me.

The subjects change to objects when they are receiving the action. Try changing these:

You (plural) work with him. ← He works with us.

She likes me. I like her.

We talk to them. They talk to us.
